Family Nature Programs

New Year's Day Hike

Sun 1/1 10:00am-12:00pm

Start off the New Year by taking a 2 mile nature hike at Halyburton Park. Learn about the parks history, Long Leaf Pine forest, Carolina Bays and enjoy the outdoors as well as you hike from the Park to the Cameron Art Museum along the Cross City trail. Ages 10 & up. FREE

Backyard Birding and Bird Feeding

Sat 1/14, 3/3, 4/7 9:30-11:30am

Each season invites new visitors to your backyard. Some remain all year round, while others migrate great distances. Join park naturalist into the world of birds and discover what tasty treats and feeders will attract these fantastic creatures each season. Discover how you could build your own backyard birdy oasis. \$3/participant

Trek Upon a Long Leaf Pine Forest

Sat 1/21, 3/31, 4/7 10-11:30am

Explore nature up close as we take a hike through a long leaf pine savannah learning the many properties that make up this type of ecosystem. We will hike through several trails inside the park, and then along the forest trail of the Gary Shell Cross City Trail. Wear appropriate clothing for the weather. \$1/participant

Remnants of the Past

Fri 1/27 10am-6pm

Martin Marietta Aggregate Quarries produce limestone used for construction of roads and other needs for crushed stone. Several different ages of fossils are found at this site,

ranging from 10 thousand to 80 million years old. Theresa Celia Mowrey, NC Environmental Educator and Naturalist for Halyburton Park, and member of the North Carolina Fossil Club and Shell Club, will lead this hunt for ancient life forms. Fossils we will be hunting for include sand dollars, sea urchins, sea biscuits, seashells, shark teeth, whale bones, and other marine and terrestrial life. Wear appropriate clothing for the weather. **Steel toed shoes and hard hat is required.** The quarry has some rough terrain, and there may be some extensive walking on uneven, rocky and or steep grades depending on quarry. Any and all fossils found by participants are fair game to keep by their finders. A small day pack, a nail apron to put fossils in, small bottles for fragile finds, a chipping hammer or other tools to pry fossils loose are helpful but not crucial. Many fossils are simply laying on the surface of the ground ready to collect. In addition, you may want to bring bottled water, lunch and a snack. \$15/participant

Great Backyard Bird Count

Sat 2/11 9:00am-12:00pm
The Great Backyard Bird Count is an annual four-day event that engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of where the birds are across the continent. Anyone can participate, from beginning bird watchers to experts. We will explore the area around Halyburton Park to indentify birds, as well as learn how to submit data. Ages 10 & up. FREE

Snake and Turtle Feeding

Enjoy a brief presentation about the live animals on display in the Event Center and then watch them feed. At least one snake and a turtle will be fed during the demonstration. Ages 3 & up. \$1/participant

Adult Programs

An Odyssey into the World of Fossils

Fri 1/6 10am-6pm
Martin Marietta Aggregate Quarries produce limestone used for construction of roads and other needs for crushed stone. Several different ages of fossils are found at this site, ranging from 10 thousand to 80 million years old. Theresa Celia Mowrey, NC Environmental Educator and Naturalist for Halyburton Park, and member of the North Carolina Fossil Club and Shell Club, will lead this hunt for ancient life forms. Fossils we will be hunting for include sand dollars, sea urchins, sea biscuits, seashells, shark teeth, whale bones, and other marine and terrestrial life. Outer Banks Birding Trip

Lake Mattamuskeet, Pocosin Lakes, Alligator River and Pea Island National Wildlife Refuges
Sat 1/28 to Sun 1/29 5am-6pm
The Outer Banks of N.C. is a premier birding destination on the East Coast. This trip will focus on waterfowl, shorebirds and land birds of Eastern North Carolina and the Outer Banks. We will tour Pocosin Lakes and Lake Mattamuskeet NWR, home to tens of thousands of Tundra Swan and Snow Geese, to observe a variety of migratory waterfowl. On our way to the Outer Banks we will visit Alligator River NWR, home of the endangered Red Wolf, to observe land birds and Short-eared Owls at dusk. After a day of birding, we will check in to the Comfort Inn in Nags Head and then head out to one of the many delectable Outer Banks restaurants. On Sunday we will visit the Pea Island NWR, Oregon Inlet and Bodie Island to observe a variety of waterfowl and shorebirds. **Cost is \$55/participant** with transportation and entrance fees included. Lodging (Double room, Bayside view at Comfort Inn) and meals are coordinated but **not included** in the cost of the trip. **Registration deadline is January 14.**

Project WET Workshop

Thu 2/9 9am-4pm
Project WET (Water Education for Teachers) is an interdisciplinary water education program. The goal of Project WET is to facilitate and promote the awareness, appreciation, knowledge and stewardship of water resources through ready made activities. This program is open to classroom teachers, resource agency educators, preschool and daycare teachers, youth organization leaders (i.e. 4-H, Scouts and Campfire), nature center instructors, and home School Teachers. Learn how to facilitate and promote awareness, appreciation, knowledge, and stewardship of North Carolina's water resources, with particular emphasis on the local ponds and watersheds. This workshop is a fun, hands-on, action-packed, informational workshop for anyone interested in natural resources and environmental education. Earn 10 hours of credit toward NC Environmental Education, and Certification and Continuing Education Units (CEU's).

The workshop offers educators exciting new activities to use in teaching science, math, language arts, social studies, and environmental studies. \$25/participant

Aurora Fossil Museum and Phosphate Mine Tour

Fri 3/23 8am-6pm
The museum has a wide variety of Pleistocene, Pliocene and Miocene marine fossils on display. Most displays feature specimens collected from the local PotashCorp mine (formerly referred to as Lee Creek). This famous mine has been called the most important source of Pliocene and Miocene fossils in the world. We will take a tour of the local phosphate mine, explore the museum and gift shop, and then hunt for fossils in the piles at the museum. These piles, also known as the "Pit of the Pungo", are an unlimited source of Miocene age fossils that was donated by the local phosphate mine. In these fossil rich soils, one may find the remains of ancient sharks, whales, bony fish, corals, shells and other invertebrates. You may want to bring a trowel or sifter, and bags. Small jars for delicate finds may be used as well. In addition, you may want to bring bottled water, lunch, snacks, and a day pack. Wear appropriate clothing for the weather. \$35/participant

Bird Hikes along the NC Birding Trail

The NC Birding Trail is a driving trail to link birders with great birding sites across the state and the local communities in which they are found. North Carolina has an incredible diversity of habitats which provide food and shelter for more than 440 bird species throughout the year, making it a premiere destination for birders and nature-lovers. Each month we will explore a different site along the Coastal Plain Trail in Southeastern NC. Each hike will be approximately 2 miles. Transportation from Halyburton Park is included. \$10/participant
